

Drug, Alcohol and Tobacco Prevention, Health Education**

The Board is committed to a comprehensive health education and health service program as an integral part of each student's general education. This program shall include drug and alcohol prevention instruction.

A drug, alcohol and tobacco prevention curriculum shall be developed in consultation with parents, teachers, school administrators, local community agencies and persons from the medical or mental health community.

The curriculum shall emphasize prevention, shall present current medical research and shall be consistent with the State Board of Education adopted Health Education, alcohol and tobacco Common Curriculum Goals. Each year the district will review the curriculum in consultation with the district's drug, alcohol and tobacco prevention committee and revise as necessary to reflect current research.

Students shall receive information on the effects drug, alcohol and tobacco use has on the human body and the laws relating to the use by minors of illegal drugs, alcohol and tobacco. Students shall also be involved in activities which assist in developing and reinforcing their skills for understanding and managing peer pressure, for understanding the consequences of consuming these substances, for making informed and responsible decisions and for motivating students to adopt positive attitudes toward health and wellness.

The Board shall adopt the curriculum as well as other components of the prevention plan. The age appropriate curriculum shall be taught annually in grades K-12.

Appropriate staff development shall be provided.

To further the drug, alcohol and tobacco prevention plan, the district will:

1. Develop a counseling and referral plan and procedures for students who appear to have drug, alcohol or tobacco abuse problems, including student support groups, student information groups and individual student contact by nonschool prevention, treatment and mental health specialists at the discretion of the building administrator;
2. Develop procedures for responding to drug-related medical emergencies;
3. Develop a public information program for students, parents, teachers, administrators and Board members addressing the district's comprehensive prevention and intervention plan to include the laws, harm and consequences for substance abuse, possessing, using and/or selling unlawful drugs, alcohol and tobacco;
4. Develop strategies for gaining federal funds available for drug abuse prevention program;

5. Each year students and parents shall receive a code of conduct explaining expected behaviors and related consequences for violations of the conduct code which may include discipline up to and including expulsion. Students violating the code of conduct prohibiting substance abuse, possessing, selling and/or using unlawful drugs or alcohol may be subject to an assessment and, if appropriate, referred to law enforcement officials.
6. The district's Drug, Alcohol and Tobacco Prevention, Health Education policy, related policies, rules and procedures will be reviewed annually and updated, as needed.

The district shall record incidences and report the findings to the Board in a meeting held over the summer.
