

Suspension/Temporary Exclusion

Suspension

1. Suspension temporarily removes from a student the privilege of attending school or school activities and places the student under the supervision of the parent. The length of the suspension shall be determined by the severity of the act and previous deportment of the student.
2. The period of suspension should not exceed a maximum of 10 school days.

In special circumstances, a suspension may be continued until some specific pending action occurs, such as physical or mental examination, incarceration by court action or expulsion proceedings.

3. After reviewing available information, suspension may be made by the principal or his/her designee in accordance with administrative regulations developed by the superintendent.

Temporary Exclusion

1. Temporary exclusion is permitted under Oregon Revised Statutes and defined as "...the condition or conduct of the child which constitutes an imminent danger to the health or safety of the child or others."
2. The length of the temporary exclusion shall be determined by the severity of the problem and the student's progress.
3. The following are types of temporary exclusions:
 - a. The student is excluded from participating in extracurricular activities;
 - b. The student is excluded from classes and/or from extracurricular activities (in-school suspension);
 - c. The student studies at home and comes to school to meet with a counselor/teacher on a scheduled basis;
 - d. The student is excluded from school grounds and premises. He/She studies at home and the school provides a home tutor.
4. Temporary exclusions may be made by the principal or designee following administrative regulations developed by the superintendent.
