Student Athlete Drug Testing**

As part of the district's substance abuse prevention efforts, all students in grades 9-12 who participate in extracurricular athletic programs (hereinafter "student athletes") will be subject to random urinalysis drug testing in order to:

1. Provide for the student athletes' health and safety by preventing the use of alcohol and drugs;
2. Undermine the effects of peer pressure; and
3. Encourage participation in treatment programs for student athletes with substance abuse problems.

No student athlete shall be penalized academically for testing positive for illegal drugs. Test results will not be documented in any student's education records. Information regarding the results of drug tests will not be disclosed to criminal or juvenile authorities absent a valid and binding subpoena or other legal process, which the district shall not solicit.

In the event of a subpoena or other legal process, the district will attempt to notify the student's parent(s) or legal guardian prior to releasing information.

Student athletes may be tested at the beginning of any athletic season in which he/she participates. Random testing will be conducted periodically thereafter by a method determined by the district to assure the integrity, confidentiality and random nature of the selection process.

The superintendent will develop administrative regulations to implement the drug testing program in accordance with the provisions of law.
