Drug, Alcohol and Tobacco Prevention, Health Education**

The district will not tolerate the possession, selling, use or influence of alcohol, tobacco, and other illegal and harmful drugs (illicit drugs, non-therapeutic use of prescribed drugs, misuse of solvents and other dangerous substances) in the schools, on school grounds or during school sponsored activities including athletic events, dances, field trips, etc.

Given the extensive promotion and use of alcohol, tobacco and drugs in our society, schools have an obligation to provide drug education that emphasizes prevention, to describe intervention and referral procedures, and to outline consequences. The district will provide a planned staff development and a public information program to the extent possible within the budget.

Drug Prevention Program

Each K-8 student shall receive alcohol/drug/tobacco prevention instruction as part of the health education program.

A curriculum for students 9-12 will be developed by the district. Instruction will be integrated in the health education curriculum and will be consistent with Common Curriculum Goals. For students not enrolled in health education, the district will develop a program of activities which reflect current research and meets the requirements of the alcohol/drug/tobacco prevention rule. Activities may include: workshops, conferences, clubs, assemblies or a review of the school climate.

The district is committed to an aggressive intervention and referral program to eliminate alcohol, drug, and tobacco use. The program shall include training for staff and the compilation of information about school and community resources and procedures for responding to substance-related incidents including emergency medical care.

Parents, students and staff, shall annually receive information and detailed procedures regarding the district's intervention/referral program.

Each year students and parents shall receive a code of conduct in the Student Responsibility and Rights Handbook explaining expected behaviors and related consequences for violations of the conduct code. Students violating the code of conduct prohibiting possessing, using and/or selling alcohol, drugs and tobacco shall be subject to an assessment.

Educators are not policemen and should not be expected to act as such. Therefore, when a student appears to have broken the law, proper authorities will be called to take appropriate action.

The district will actively seek funds to support the activities identified in the district's alcohol and drug prevention program.

The superintendent, in cooperation with the building site councils shall provide an in-service addressing the district's alcohol, drug, and tobacco prevention program/plan, the staff's responsibilities within the plan and current alcohol and drug information.

The district will develop a public information plan for students, staff, and parents.
