

## Student Drug Testing \*\*

As part of the district's substance abuse prevention efforts, mandatory drug testing will be required of all students participating in extracurricular, cocurricular and district-sponsored activities, grades 7-12 in order to:

1. Provide for student health and safety; and
2. Ameliorate the effects of peer pressure.

No student shall be penalized academically for a positive result for illegal or performance-enhancing drugs. Test results will not be documented in any student's education records. Student tests which exhibit a positive drug result will be subject to sanctions under existing program requirements. Information regarding the results of drug tests will not be disclosed to criminal or juvenile authorities without a valid subpoena or other legal process, which the district shall not solicit.

In the event of a subpoena or other legal process, the district will notify the student's legal guardian or parents as applicable. Notice will be made as soon as practical prior to providing information.

Students participating in extracurricular, cocurricular and district-sponsored activities may be tested at the beginning of any season in which he/she participates. Additional testing may be conducted periodically during the activity using a method determined by the district to assure the integrity and confidentiality of the selection process.

The superintendent will develop administrative regulations to implement the drug-testing program in accordance with the provisions of law.
